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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings to our members and I want to first thank all of you for your continued support to make the year 2022 a successful year of recovery after being disrupted by the Covid-19 pandemic since 2020. During the difficult 2 years TI-Malaysia had to adapt to new ways of working and persisted in the fight against corruption, demanded greater transparency from the government and holding officials to account for failing in their fiduciary duties.

Since GE 14 until the recently concluded GE 15 in November 2022, we saw four (4) different prime ministers and an unstable government due to the thin majority in parliament. However. with the Memorandum Understanding (MOU) signed between the Pakatan Harapan opposition block and the government then, resulted in major changes to the constitution and set the path for more reforms in future. First the passing of the minimum, voting age of 18 and automatic voter registration. Second was the passing of the anti-hopping law to prohibit law makers from switching parties and betraying the trust of the rakyat.

For the year 2022 the Corruption Perception Index (CPI) results revealed that Malaysia continues to take the wrong trajectory. Malaysia 's score deteriorated 6 points from 53 points in 2019 to 47 points in 2022 which is statistically very significant. We have a new government now and the 10th Prime Minister Dato' Seri Anwar Ibrahim emphasizing on good governance , transparency, integrity and democratic accountability, there is some hope that several institutional reforms could take place under this unity government. Other positive announcements made by the government are as follows which augurs well for future CPI scores:

- Mandatory competitive bidding for procurement contracts
- ✓ Review of certain high value projects

- ✓ Prime Minister instructing his ministers to address the adverse findings in the Auditor General's Report
- ✓ Good governance and corrupt free Malaysia to boost foreign investor confidence
- ✓ Reforming the MACC to be more independent and reporting to a parliamentary select committee

Other reforms are legislative changes to strengthen governance. Among those are Political **Funding** Act, Government Procurement Act, separation of power between the Attorney General and the Public Prosecutor, amendment to the Whistle Blower Protection Act 2010 and Freedom of Information Act to replace the Official Secrets Act. Our society has for the past three (3) years called on the government to continue the implementation of the National Anti-Corruption 5-year Plan which will end in 2023. It is disappointing to note that only less than 40% of the 115 initiatives have been implemented. Majority of the implementers are the government agencies and the ministry officials and our recommendations was for the Chief Secretary to the government be made the main driver to implement this plan as he is head of the civil service and with him leading this initiative will force the Chief Secretaries in the various ministries to accelerate the implementation. However, the government has yet to respond to these recommendations.

Our key activities in 2022 were congruent with the strategic plan and I am pleased to report that we have completed 100% of the shortterm plans. Among the main completed areas are as follows:

- ✓ Stopping the flow of dirty money-Awareness Program
- ✓ Conducted jointly with other CSOs engagement with law makers on the various institutional reforms. (Recently two APPGs -All Parties Parliamentary Groups have been formed).
- ✓ Business Integrity-Capacity Building in Governance & Risk-Corporate Liability and Adequate Procedures. Done in Penang, Negeri Sembilan, Kedah, Johor, Sarawak & Sabah.
- ✓ Develop Corruption & Bribery checklist. English version launched. Bahasa Melayu version will be released soon.
- ✓ Advocate for the amendment of the Whistle Blower Protection Act. TI-Malaysia participated along with MACC, BHEUU and other CSOs in several workshops to push our recommendations.
- ✓ Building closer relationship and support media by training young

- investigative journalist. Two workshops done.
- ✓ Learning tools -CPI methodology and the Integrity Pact
- ✓ Upskilling of TI Secretariat-Done by sending staffs to attend the course in Transparency School in TI-Lithuania (virtual) and the IACA (International Anti-Corruption Academy).
- ✓ Continuous improvement in internal governance. Policies on anti-sexual harassment, donation and due diligence established and available on the website.

On the medium-term plans (3-5 years) a few projects have been initiated and those are still under work in progress. Among them are as follows:

- ✓ Community Integrity Building as a pilot project
- ✓ Asset Declaration advocacy work among the law makers other elected representatives
- ✓ Beneficial Ownership

The Executive Committee wish to record our deep appreciation to the various donors, corporate members, individual members and our funders CIPE for providing the support to carry out various activities in 2022.

INTRODUCTION

Bribery and corruption have been a longstanding issue in Malaysia, and the pandemic may have exacerbated some of the existing challenges. TI Malaysia ("the Chapter") has stood firm on its ground that matters related to transparency, governance and accountability will not be taken lightly. We have also recognised the fact that "it takes two hands to clap", hence both the public and private sector should be deemed liable for participation in such incidences.

Our efforts in early 2022 had been largely directed towards equipping the private sector with the tools to prevent any person associated to it from participating in acts of bribery. We had successfully developed and published the Guidance for Good Practice and Checklist on Adequate Procedures ("the Guide") in February 2022. This was a joint effort between various stakeholders from the private and public sector to ensure that the Guide developed is deemed fit for our local setting and complies with international standards for best practices. A series of workshops were held to discuss pertinent aspects related to the T.R.U.S.T Principles prior to consolidation of information and publication.

In recognition of that the Small Medium Enterprises ("SMEs") may find it difficult to implement many of the items subjected in the Guide developed, the team at TI Malaysia had taken the initiative to develop an Employer's Handbook on Bribery / Corruption Offences and the Corporate Liability Provision (e-book), specifically dedicated to SMEs in Malaysia. The e-book has been published in four (4) different languages (English, Malay, Tamil, and Mandarin) and made publicly available for download as and when it is required.

Development of these tools were just the beginning as TI Malaysia had embarked on a series of roadshows / forums throughout

Malaysia, specifically on "Post Section 17A and the Challenges in Establishing Adequate Procedures" to facilitate the understanding of matters related to the legislation and use of tools developed by the Chapter. With the continued support from the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC) and state legislatures, we had managed to conduct a series of face-to-face sessions in the states of Penang, Negeri Sembilan, Johor, Sabah and Sarawak.

TI Malaysia had also seen our partnerships and corporate engagements grow throughout 2022. A notable event of such would be a forum organised with Cyberview Sdn Bhd, which focused on the aspects of technology as a deterrence and a tool to combat bribery and corruption. Further, the Chapter had also participated in events with Bank Islam Malaysia Berhad and the Employee Provident Fund ("KWSP"). Deepened ties were established as we received visits from KWSP and the Retirement Fund Incorporated ("KWAP") to discuss future collaborations on integrity and anti-corruption related events and engagements.

We are also honoured to announce that our Transparency International Secretariat in Berlin received a visit from Malaysia's Foreign Minister Datuk Seri Saifuddin Abdullah on 25 September 2022 while he was visiting Germany for the Special Programme to Promote Language and

Cultural Diplomacy from Sept 27 to Oct 2. Together with the Malaysian delegation, TI-Malaysia's former Secretary General Datuk Dr Anis Yusal Yusoff accompanied the minister. The delegation was received by TI-Secretariat's Managing Director Dr Daniel Erikson and other members of the secretariat. The minister was updated on Malaysia's ranking and score in the Global Corruption Perception Index (CPI), Global Corruption Barometer (GCB) and the Integrity Pact tools. TI Malaysia also continued its efforts to push for investigative journalism which is still at an infant stage in Malaysia. We see very few young journalists are excited in investigative journalism. Among our activities include creating awareness and preparedness among our young to report matters related to financial crime in Malaysia. A series of workshops were put into motion, with our 1st installation being the "Shinning a light onto Corruption" workshop that included participation of well known, journalists to speak and discuss some of the challenges that a young journalist may face in this particular area of reporting. We, at TI Malaysia are keen to carry on with this momentum and set further in-depth learning and development sessions to facilitate the scene of investigative reporting in Malaysia.

Besides the forums, engagement sessions and training programs organized by the Chapter, we

have been actively advocating for legal reforms and measures to enhance transparency and accountability throughout the spectrum. Some of the notable reforms pushed by TI Malaysia includes amendments to Whistleblowing Protection Regulating Political Act 2010, Financing and Beneficial Ownership Transparency.

It is worth to also note that the Chapter will be making efforts in providing awareness and reference materials on Anti-Money Laundering and Counter Financing of Terrorism, would pave the way forward for the upcoming year.

CORRUPTION PERCEPTIONS INDEX 2022

TI-Malaysia hosted an event on January 31st to announce the results of the 2022 Corruption Perceptions Index (CPI). Members, media representatives, and other relevant parties attended the event at the Royal Selangor Club.

Malaysia's score dropped from 48 in 2021 to 47 in 2022, , due to factors as suggested by Dr. Muhammad Mohan on a lack of political will in combating institutional corruption, patronage in appointments, COVID-19 stimulus packages without parliamentary debate, governance failures, and slow progress in anti-corruption measures.


Despite these challenges, there have been some positive developments, such as the Memorandum of Understanding between the government and the opposition, the lower voting age, an anti-hopping law, progress on the Malaysia Agreement (MA) 63, and the Prime Minister's emphasis on good governance, corruption-fighting, and judicial independence. To address corruption concerns attract foreign investment, government has also announced mandatory competitive bidding for procurement contracts, as well as a review of high-value projects.

TI-Malaysia has provided a comprehensive list of recommendations to improve Malaysia's CPI score, including information transparency,

public administration, governance legislation, and the strengthening of the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC). TI-Malaysia has advocated for broadening the scope of the Official Secrets Act, transparent information sharing, and monitoring of the National Anti-Corruption Plan. The recommendations also include empowering the KSN to implement the NACP, requiring parliamentary approval for large projects, and expanding whistleblower reporting channels. Separate funding, direct reporting to Parliament, and amendments to the MACC Act and the Federal Constitution are among the MACC recommendations. These recommendations are intended to improve Malaysia's transparency and governance, reduce corruption, and hold public officials accountable.

There are also several initiatives underway or planned that have the potential to have a significant impact on Malaysia's fight against corruption, including the National Anti-Corruption Plan. MACC strengthening, implementation of international standards on integrity pact in government procurement, and amendments to laws such as the Whistleblower Protection Act, Election Offences Act, and Asset Declaration Act. If these measures are successfully implemented, they have the potential to significantly improve Malaysia's CPI score and reputation.

MALAYSIA'S SCORE




Note: 1. 100 (very clean) to 0 (highly corrupt)



DATO SRI SAIFUDDIN VISIT TO TRANSPARENCY INTERNATIONAL IN BERLIN

Transparency International Secretariat in Berlin received a visit from Malaysia's Foreign Minister Datuk Seri Saifuddin Abdullah on 25 September 2022 while he was visiting Germany for the Special Programme to Promote Language and Cultural Diplomacy from Sept 27 to Oct 2. Together with the Malaysian delegation, TI-Malaysia's former Secretary General Datuk Dr Anis Yusal Yusoff accompanied the minister.

The delegation was received by TI-Secretariat's Managing Director Dr Daniel Erikson and other members of the secretariat. The minister was updated on Malaysia's ranking and score in the Global Corruption Perception Index (CPI), Global Corruption Barometer (GCB) and the Integrity Pact tools. The research team explained to the Malaysian delegation on the methodology, data consolidation and rescaling of the various data sources before the scores are calculated. All the results are audited by the European Commission Joint Research Centre. The researchers explained to the visitors on what is captured and what is not captured in the CPI measure.

The minister was also briefed on the following as part of Transparency International's global strategy.

- Protecting Public Resources
- Stop the Flow of Dirty Money
- Secure Integrity in Politics
- Drive Integrity in Business
- Pursue Enforcement and Justice
- Expand Civic Space for Accountability
- •Build Community Leadership Against Leadership

The minister expressed his deep concern on the deterioration of Malaysia's score and ranking in the CPI and assured that he will convey the message to the Prime Minister and investigate ways on how the government could accelerate the implementation of the National Anti-Corruption Plan (NACP).

Moving forward Dr Daniel expressed his hope to have more engagement in future with the Malaysian government to support reform initiatives that has started. It is believed that such collaboration will go a long way to improve Malaysia's position.





KWSP AND KWAP VISIT TO TI-MALAYSIA'S SECRETARIAT OFFICE

On 29 December 2022, a meeting between members of the Employees Provident Fund (KWSP) and the Retirement Fund Incorporated (KWAP) and the team at TI-Malaysia was held to discuss the possibility of future partnerships between the three organizations. The dire financial situation of Pembinaan PFI Sdn Bhd, a firm that has racked up a huge debt of approximately RM50 Billion, was the primary topic of conversation throughout the meeting.

Fruitful discussions were held between KWSP, KWAP and TI-Malaysia for GLICs to practice good governance and conduct proper due diligence before any funding is recommended to their respective boards.

Tuan Jayaraj Goval of MACC Penang delivered an immersive and detailed segment on the types of corruption practices as well as guideline which can be used to prevent corruption in the corporate sector.

Our second speaker was Puan Nurirdzuana Ismail, the Head of Integrity and Governance of Maxis Berhad, who spoke on The Implementation of Adequate Procedures and its Challenges for Maxis Berhad. She took the participants through the difficulties and process of implementing Adequate Procedures in a large corporation like Maxis Berhad.

Our third and final speaker was Miss Lim Hang Thing, the Chief Operating Officer, Trili Maju Sdn Bhd from Penang. Her segment titled The Implementation of Adequate Procedures and Its Challenges for Trili Maju Sdn Bhd, covering similar aspects of the difficulties and process of implementing Adequate Procedures as the speaker before her but from the perspective of an SME.


WOMEN AGAINST CORRUPTION: COMING TOGETHER AS MALAYSIANS

ENCOURAGE WOMEN TO REPORT WRONGDOING

On 19 February 2022, TI-Malaysia organised a forum where a panel of professionals shared their personal experience about addressing the issue of corruption in the country. The forum was launched by Dr Muhammad Mohan, TI-M President and moderated by our member Ms Geetha. The forum started with a presentation titled "The Gendered Impacts of Corruption, are Women Less Corrupted Than Men?" by Ms. Alexandra Hakansson Schmidt, Program Analyst-Governance, Peace & Security of UN Women. She elaborated that corruption affects women disproportionally than men in the aspects where women are more likely to pay bribes for health services meanwhile women with higher levels of education are more vulnerable to paying bribes to public schools. Although there is no conclusive direct relationship between eradicating corruption and better representation of women, however, increasing the number of women in politics contributes to building accountability and governance systems that are transparent and responsive to the needs of women and men

Cynthia Gabriel from C4 Center pointed out that insufficient protection for whistleblowers is impacting women negatively as in addition to not having proper protection from the law, women are also prone to harassment and bullying that are gender centred. This was reiterated by Dato Sutinah, Ex-Deputy Commissioner, MACC.

The forum continued with the presentation from YB Dato Seri Azalina Othman Said - Member of Parliament, Pengerang where she touched on gender mainstreaming from the political perspective. She called for having laws enacted to have more women participation in higher managerial positions and take on political roles.

TRAINING WORKSHOP ON INVESTIGATIVE JOURNALISM

SHINING A LIGHT ONTO CORRUPTION

Transparency International Malaysia's (TI-M) fight for Transparency and Integrity in Malaysia often requires the efforts of journalists to bring light to issues and news surrounding corruption in Malaysia. As such, our organisation requires more brave journalists particularly those who specialise in investigative journalism to assist our organisation in raising awareness and publishing the truth dispassionately and equitably. Investigative journalism is needed more than ever in Malaysia today. Behind every corner now is a new scandal or some form of embezzlement. Integrity and accountability are waning and our public's confidence in our government and its institutions are on a decline.

TI-M decided to play a role in growing this niche field of journalism by organising a workshop on investigative journalism to train young journalist and expose them to the reality of the art behind investigative journalism.

The workshop titled Training Workshop on Investigative Journalism was held on the 7th of June 2022 from 9am to 5pm. The workshop was open to young Malaysian journalists aged below 35 years old. Initially TI-M planned for the workshop to have 30 participants at most. However, due to the overwhelming response from our invitations, 35 participants from 27 organisations and 30 entities, took part in our workshop. All our participants were based in

Peninsular Malaysia. It was unfortunate that there were no participants from Sabah and Sarawak despite our best efforts as they were not able to send representatives to attend the physical session in Peninsular Malaysia. TI-M's next goal is to host a similar event in East Malaysia dedicated to young journalists based in Sabah and Sarawak.

We were fortunate to have Dr. G Manimaran as our moderator and facilitator of the event. Without his assistance we would not have been able to round up as many journalists and media personalities to successfully conduct this event. Dr. G Manimaran also carefully curated the speakers for this workshop based on his years of experience in the media.

First among which was Mr.Chew Phye Keat. Mr. Chew is the managing partner of Messrs Raja, Darryl & Loh and a TI-M EXCO member. His segment was titled "Whistleblowers Protection Act and the Media". He spoke at length on the Whistleblower Protection Act 2010 and broke it down to the participating journalists.

The second speaker was Dato' Dr Ahmad Murad Merican who is a professor of social and intellectual history, an essayist, and a columnist. He delivered a session filled with honesty and worldliness, talking about his experience in the sphere of journalism. His segment titled "Investigative Journalism: Theorizing the Practice" was a lesson in journalism from an academic perspective. The participants had the opportunity to question

him on how academic knowledge in journalism could help enhance expertise in investigative journalism.

FORUM ON INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS TOWARDS MANAGING CORRUPTION IN MALAYSIA

TECHNOLOGY AS ANTI-CORRUPTION TOOLS

TI-M in partnership with Cyberview Sdn. Bhd. hosted a forum featuring leading experts in the fields of blockchain, data analytics, and data driven risk detection to acknowledge the power of technology in the fight against bribery and corruption. In attendance were government agencies, GLCs and corporate bodies.

We were honored to have Datuk Mohd Najib Dato' Ibrahim, Cyberview's Managing Director, open the forum, followed by Jessica Chuah, Chainalysis' Country Manager (Malaysia), Dr. Mark Lovatt, CEO and Principal Consultant of Trident Technology, and Joleen Yoong, Director of Client Coverage, Handshakes Malaysia.

In Tan Sri Dato' Seri Mohd Zuki Ali, Chief Secretary to the Government's keynote address, he highlighted technology in making a difference by enabling efficient corruption investigations, making business processes more transparent and accountable, and leveling the playing field for all parties in a keynote address delivered by Sr. Salem Mohd Khailany; Chairman of Board's Audit, Risk & Integrity Committee (BARIC) & Board Member, Cyberview Sdn Bhd.

To combat corruption, Datuk Mohd Najib insisted on the need to keep up with technology and scalable tech solutions to improve processes, reduce human intervention, and increase transparency.

Jessica Chuah, COO of US-based start-up, Hyperledger adds that blockchain deals with immutable data that is unalterable and permanently logged with proof of record that reduces opportunity for corruption to happen. Then, Dr. Mark Lovatt from Trident highlighted the role of artificial intelligence in fighting fraud and corruption by identifying broken processes in need of rework/fix and mainstream patterns of malpractice, fraud, and corruption for further human investigation.

UNDERSTANDING ANTI-MONEY LAUNDERING/COUNTER FINANCING OF TERRORISM

Transparency International-Malaysia (TI-M) hosted an online forum entitled "Awareness on Anti-Money Laundering & Counter Financing of Terrorism" with 35 participants in attendance, aiming to cultivate awareness and demystify the complexities of Anti Money Laundering/Counter Financing of Terrorism (AML/CFT) Standards and the Regulatory Compliance procedures subjected to reporting institutions in Malaysia.

The forum focused on three key topics for raising awareness: the essential features of money laundering and terrorism financing; the disparity of methods between international and local regimes; and the obligations of "Know Your Customer" (KYC) and "Suspicious Transaction Report" (STR) for reporting institutions.

Nurizzati Muhammad Nor, TI-M Senior Executive, moderated the forum, with contributions from Raymond Ram, TI-M Secretary General, Mohd Nazri, Researcher and Trainer, and Afiqah Ayub, TI-M EXCO Member, as speakers.



The amendment requires organisations to put in place adequate procedures to prevent employees and agents from committing bribery to further the organisations' interests. 

This reform will not only allow MACC to investigate anyone but at the secure a fixed tenure in office for the Chief Commissioner. At the moment the candidate for the post is decided by the executive. This will ensure the Chief Commissioner cannot be removed by any incoming Prime Minister or new government unless by a special tribunal. This will however require legislative changes.

TRANSPARENCY INTERNATIONAL MOVEMENT SUMMIT: THE BUSINESS CASE FOR INTEGRITY

SUPPORTING BUSINESS INTEGRITY AT THE NATIONAL LEVEL

On June 20, 2022, TI-Malaysia (TI-M) participated in a movement summit organised by TI chapter in Berlin entitled "The Business Case for Integrity". Mr. Raymon Ram, TI-M Secretary General is one of the panels of the session. The discussion highlighted the difficulties of businesses to receive trust in terms of transparency and integrity. Responding to the question by the moderator, Mr. Ravi Prasad on Mr. Raymon's opinion bringing businesses, governments and society to strengthen integrity and anti-bribery mechanism, he mentioned that as a national chapter, TI-M must act together with the

private sector and law enforcements, bridging those actors and create a channel for dialogue. This will help to clear any doubts or concerns they may have in adopting the best anti-bribery and anti-corruption practices.

Furthermore, he shared Malaysia's recent move in adopting the Corporate Liability Provision under Section 17(A) of the MACC act 2009. With the enactment of this act, companies are finally allocating resources towards the integrity management, having proper compliance and put in adequate procedures in order to prevent any person associated with these commercial organisations from getting involved in such act of bribery or corruption. Another key takeaway by Mr. Raymon Ram was that although different organisations have different corruption risks and size of resources allocation, risk assessments should be the backbone of any preventive measure or business integrity management mechanism within the organisation. With this, TI-M is working hand-in-hand to have a proper risk assessment done for them.

POLITICAL FINANCING ACT: CURRENT STATUS, CHALLENGE AND THE WAY FORWARD

INDEPENDENCE OF REGULATING POLITICAL FINANCING

On May 19 2022, Prime Minister YAB Dato' Sri Ismail Sabri bin Yaakob announced that the Special Cabinet Committee on Anti-Corruption has agreed in principle to the proposed enactment of the political financing bill and that the policy scope will be tabled with the Cabinet before further engagement with the political parties. This has put the political financing act in a new light. Since 2009, numerous reform proposals have been made by various parties, and a bill was created during the Pakatan Harapan administration but was never introduced.

In response to a resurgence of interest in the subject, IDEAS and the Malaysian Bar Council coorganized a joint conference on the Political Financing Act on 23 June. The conference consists of 4 sessions. Mr. Alan Kirupakaran, TI-M Executive Committee Member was the speaker of the third session entitled, "Independence of Regulating Political Financing: A Proposed New Commission". The session covers the pros and cons of establishing a new commission to monitor political financing versus relying on the current institutions such as the Election Commission.

In 2009, TI-M published a book on political financing resulting from research, interviews and proposed recommendations. The book, "Reforming political financing in Malaysia" was a hot topic. However, more than 10 years later, Malaysia still does not have a political financing law in place. According to Alan, there are two entities that can play the role in monitoring political financing-The Election Commission (EC) and The Registrar of Societies (ROS). As stated in the book 13 years ago, TI-M saw EC and ROS as possible regulators for political financing apart from having a separate new commission.

Nevertheless, both entities possess their own shortcomings and inadequacies. The independence of EC is always questioned, while ROS, on the other hand, has no requirement for the political parties to disclose their sources of funding. Mr. Alan also mentioned that what is important is to address the shortcomings and make sure that it is truly independent besides having legislation that allow them to function independently.

DR. MOHAN AND KAREN CHEAH ON THE BFM BREAKFAST GRILLE

REVERSE ANTI-CORRUPTION DECLINE, REV UP INSTITUTIONAL REFORM

Dr. Muhammad Mohan, president of Transparency International Malaysia, and Karen Cheah, president of the Malaysian Bar, were guests on the BFM Breakfast Grille with host Shazana Mokhtar on International Anti-Corruption Day 9 December 2022. "Reverse Anti-Corruption Decline, Rev Up Institutional Reforms," was the topic. Despite repeated promises from successive governments to combat corruption, Malaysia continues to fall in Transparency International's Corruption Perception Index (CPI) rankings and the topic follows on the institutional changes required to turn promises into actions.

According to Dr. Mohan, the decline in Malaysia's CPI is due to the government's lack of political will. Dr. Mohan suggests that the task of implementing the National Anti-Corruption Plan, which was introduced from 2019 to 2023, be assigned to the Chief Secretary of the government to ensure better implementation.

During the podcast, Karen Cheah stressed the lack of institutional reforms in Malaysia as well as agrees on Dr Mohan's point on the lack of political will to move forward on key issues such as the political financing bill. Karen and Dr. Mohan both emphasized the importance of the Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission having independent leadership and being empowered to investigate corruption. They also discussed the importance of allocating more resources to the MACC in order

to properly staff it, as well as the separation of the roles of the attorney general and public prosecutor.

Dr. Mohan believes that Parliament can play a larger role in controlling government spending and that parliamentary reforms are required. He also suggests limiting individual contributions to political parties and prohibiting foreign funding, GLCs, and political donations. To improve government transparency in procurement processes, Dr. Mohan suggests prioritizing initiatives outlined in the National Strategic Communications Plan and pushing amendments to the Whistleblower Protection Act 2010.





KUALA LUMPUR: Tan Sri Azam Baki's statement that Transparency International-Malaystals (TI-M) Corruption Perception Index (CPP) is not factual shows a lack of understanding of how the index works, TI-M president Dr Muhammad Mohan said.

The Malaysian Anti-Corruption Commission (MACC) chief commissioner had said the gauge was not representative of the situation in Malaysia as it measured perceived corruption.

"A country's score is given based on several surveys and expert assessments, which look at various factors in the nation, including democratic aspects, openness to foreign investors and economic factors," Muhammad said in a statement.



He added that the CPI index was a "measured indicator" and such indicators provided signals on things that were happening in the country which correlate with corruption and the authorities need to pay attention to it.
